



# The Institut de la statistique du Québec

The Institut de la statistique du Québec (ISQ) is a Québec government body created in 1998.

The mission of the Institut is to provide reliable and objective statistical information on the situation of Québec as regards all aspects of Québec society for which such information is relevant.

The Institut is the central authority for the production and dissemination of statistical information for government departments and bodies, except information produced for administrative purposes. The Institut is responsible for conducting statistical surveys of general interest.

The *Act respecting the Institut de la statistique du Québec* was passed on June 19, 1998 and assented to the following day.

The Institut may also be referred to as Statistique Québec.

The Québec government has long been active in the field of statistics. An example of this is the Bureau de la statistique du Québec (incorporated into the ISQ on April 1, 1999), which was founded in 1912, six years before Statistics Canada.

On April 1, 2003, the ISQ had 237 employees (full-time equivalent). For the 2003-2004 fiscal year, it has an operating subsidy of \$16,416,700 and it forecasts sales figures of \$6,925,285 for its statistical services.

---

## Information and Documentation Centre (CID)

The ISQ possesses the most complete inventory of statistics on Québec. This mass of information may be accessed via its Information and Documentation Centre.

The Centre contains the data, statistical publications and socioeconomic studies produced by the ISQ, as well as documents produced by Statistics Canada and various federal and provincial government departments, bodies and agencies. Users may also access international statistical data and the Statistics Canada database (CANSIM).

---

## Information and Documentation Centre (CID) (cont'd)

The Centre's personnel answer requests for statistics made in person, by telephone, by fax, by regular mail or by e-mail.

More elaborate or complex requests are forwarded to ISQ's specialized branches or to the appropriate government body.

A room has been specially set up to allow visitors to consult documents of interest to them. Tools enabling them to locate statistical information sources quickly are also available.

## Publications

The ISQ uses its different publications to disseminate statistical summaries of its databases.

## Economic Impact Studies

Produced using the ISQ's intersectorial model, an economic impact study presents a project's direct and indirect effects on the economy, i.e. on manpower, wages before taxes, added value and certain tax receipts and revenues from incidental taxation.

The ISQ economic impact studies are produced very rapidly and inexpensively.

---

## Population Forecasts and Diverse Statistics

The ISQ produces population forecasts according to different birth/mortality scenarios and various geographic details. It produces descriptive analyses of specific economic constituencies and sectors, and compendiums of regional statistics. The ISQ carries out specific studies on labour and remuneration that can be targeted according to the requirements of a specific clientele.

---

## Statistical standardization tools

The ISQ ensures that the concepts and definitions used by the Québec system comply with international standards. It standardizes the data it produces, using the appropriate codes and classifications. It manages the *Code géographique du Québec* and the *Classification des activités économiques du Québec*.

---

## Consultant and Survey Expert

The ISQ offers services in survey methodology, data analysis, statistical tool development and mathematical models.

Its consultation activities and expertise consist primarily of preparing and carrying out sampling and data analysis plans. These activities also include developing and employing quantitative methods that may be used to estimate or adjust data for seasonal variations, or also to implement models generating more specific results.

As an expert in surveys, the ISQ also offers survey planning, conducting and monitoring services.

Survey and data analysis project costs vary between a few hundred and a few thousand dollars, depending on the complexity of the work to be done.
