



117. Refers to current transfers from corporations to persons (charitable donations and other contributions) and current transfers from non-residents to persons (pensions paid by foreign residences to Canadian residents plus remittances by non-residents to Canadian residents).
118. Refers to personal income less direct taxes on persons, contributions to social insurance plans and other current transfers paid by persons to governments, such as drug insurance premiums, licences and permits.
