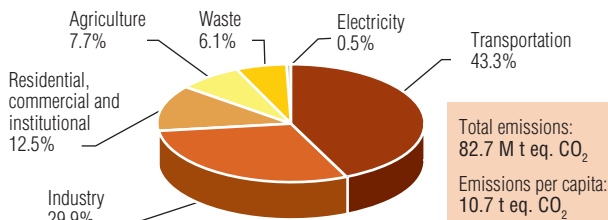

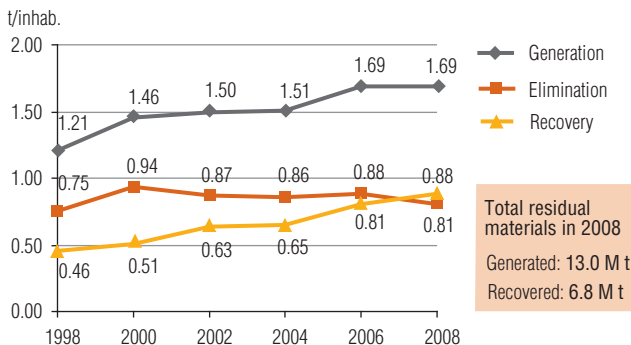

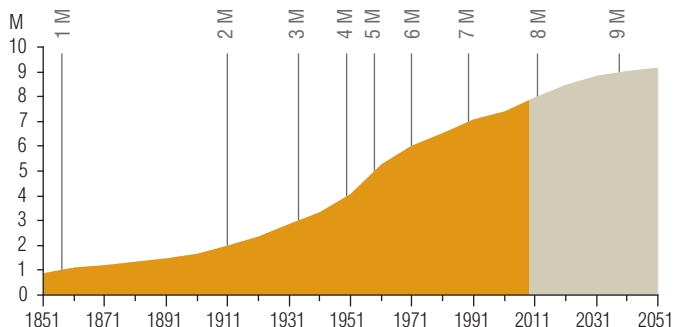
MANAGEMENT OF RESIDUAL MATERIALS,¹⁴ 1998-2008

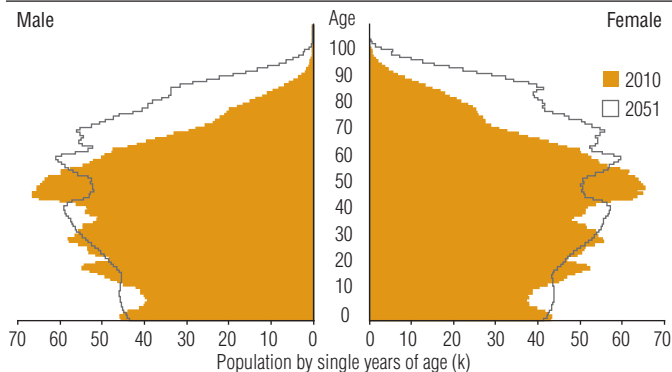
EVOLUTION AND AGE STRUCTURE OF POPULATION

AGE PYRAMID, 2010 AND 2051



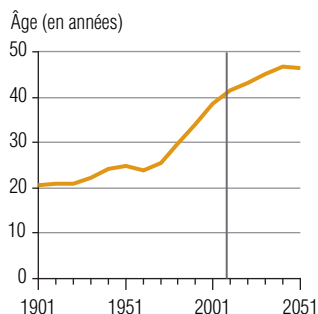

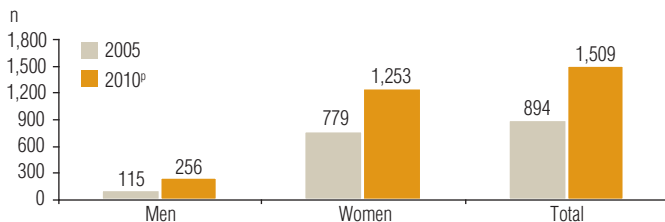

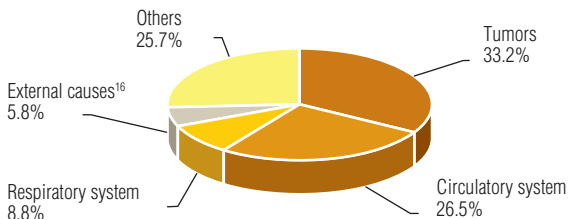

CAUSES OF DEATH, 2007

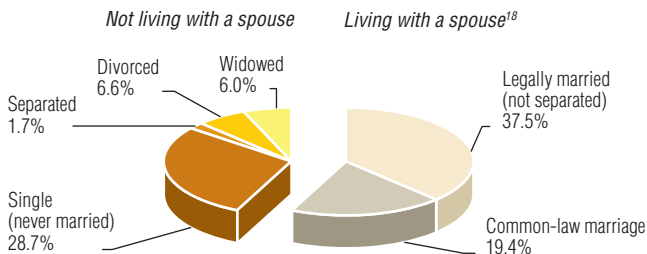

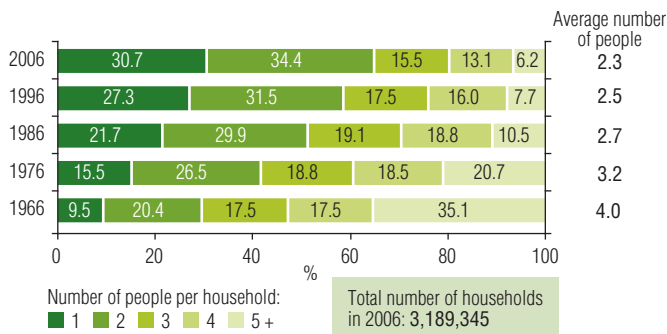

DISTRIBUTION OF HOUSEHOLDS BY SIZE, 1966-2006



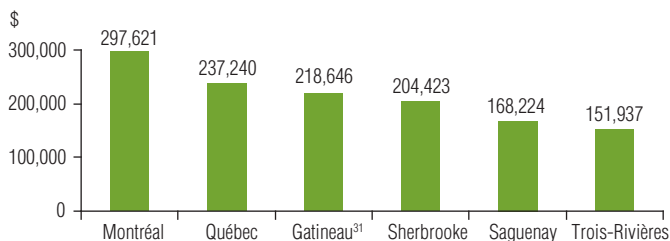

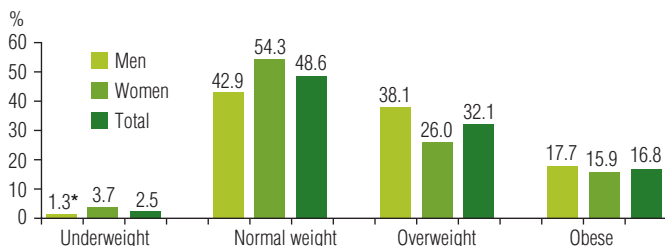

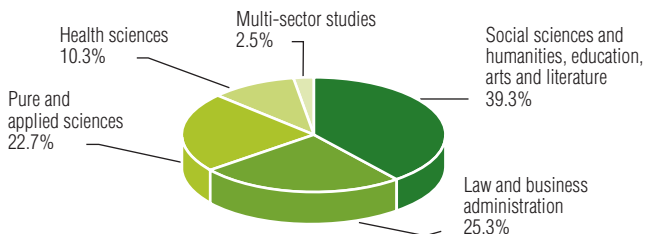

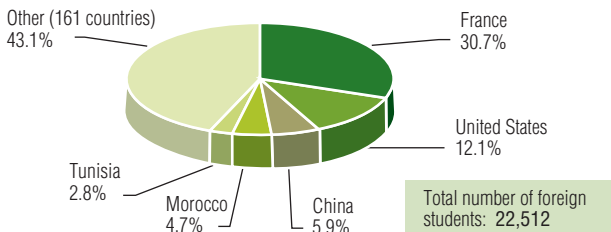
DISTRIBUTION OF UNIVERSITY DEGREES BY FIELD OF STUDY OF GRADUATES,⁶¹ 2008

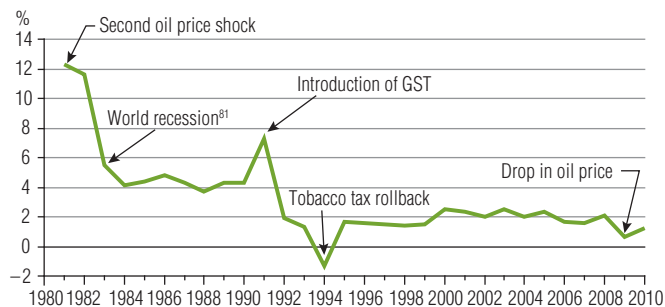

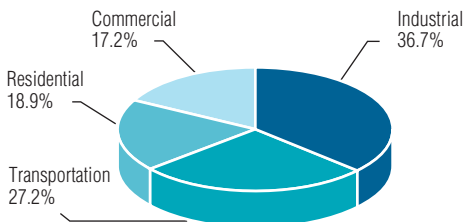

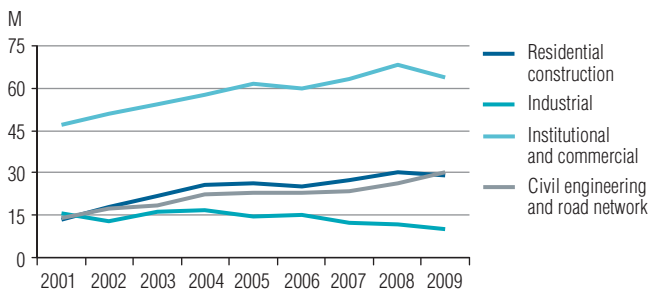

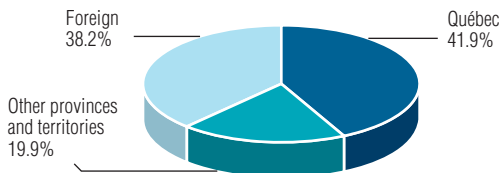
HOURS WORKED PER SECTOR, 2001-2009

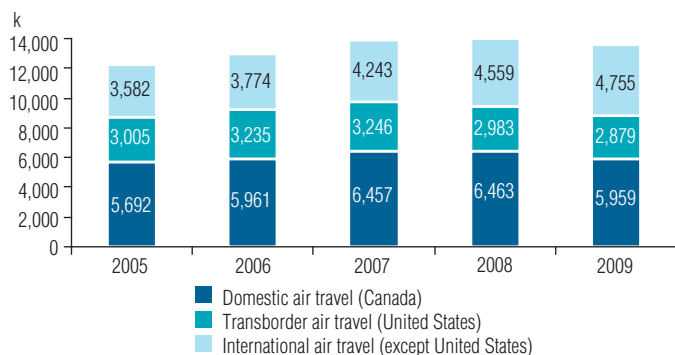

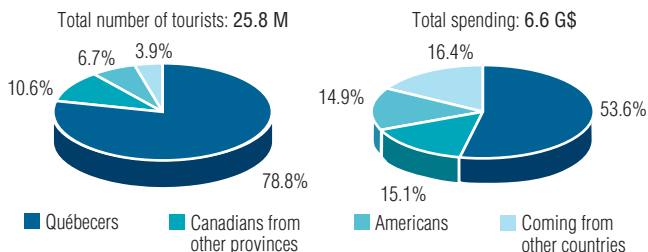

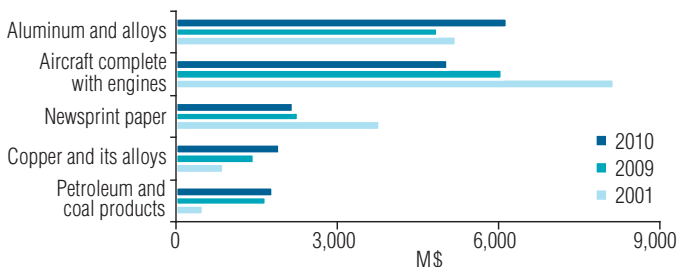

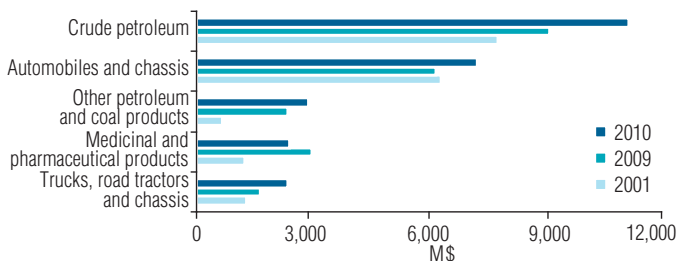

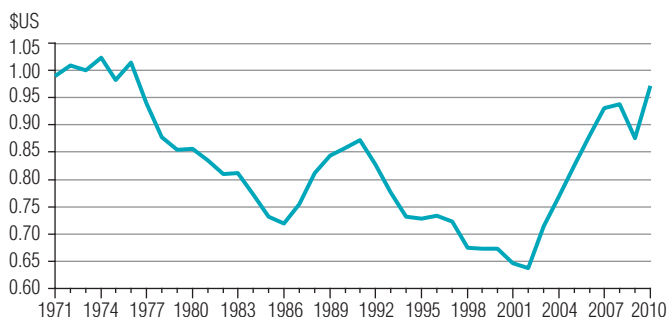

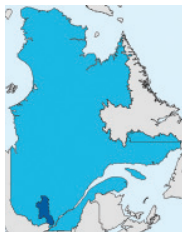
Population 15 Years and over by Highest Certificate, Diploma or Degree, 2006

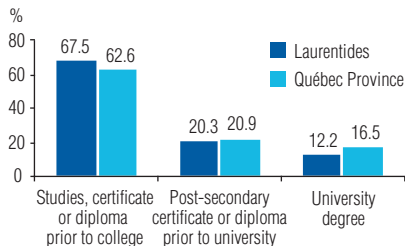

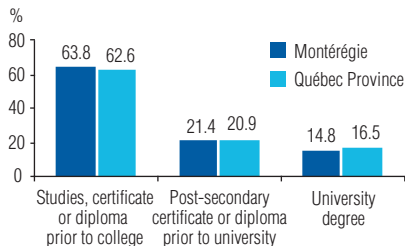

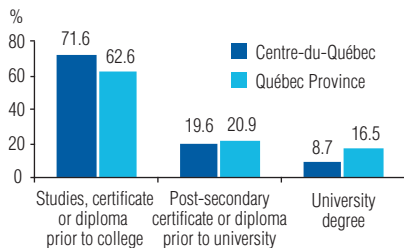
